

## Five Rules to Stay Safe in Avalanche Terrain

Pull this card with the Avaluator™ Trip Planner before making a decision about riding a slope or traveling through avalanche terrain

- Follow the terrain/travel advice in your regional avalanche bulletin. Is the route/slope consistent with the terrain/travel advice? What does the Avaluator™ Trip Planner tell you?
- 2. Stop at critical decision points and make a plan.
- 3. Involve ALL group members in the decision making process. Is everyone OK with riding or crossing this slope?
- 4. Trust your instincts. If you are doubtful or unsure about anything, SPEAK UP to your group.
- 5. Cross or ride avalanche slopes one at a time with at least one person in a safe spot.
